Try your best to foster the good days and even the good moments for the person with dementia, don't try to force them. Also, be realistic about the course of the disease. Remember that most types of dementia, including Alzheimer's, are irreversible and progressive. Dementia will tend to get worse over time and there is no known cure.

Having a general daily routine in Alzheimer's and dementia care helps caregiving run smoothly. These routines won't be set in stone, but they can give a sense of consistency, which is beneficial to the patient even if they can't communicate it. Keep a sense of structure and familiarity.

End of life care for a person with dementia can involve a number of different professionals working together, including the GP, community nurses, social workers or care home staff. Palliative care professionals at a local hospice or hospital may give specialist input if this is needed.

All care – including any you pay for – should help you to live well with dementia. The types of care put in place will be different for everyone, because everyone's needs are different. The Care Act 2014 sets out the legal responsibilities of English local authorities (councils) for adults who need care, as well as their carers.

A diagnosis of dementia doesn't necessarily mean the person will qualify for NHS continuing healthcare. People who don't qualify for continuing healthcare, but have been assessed as needing care in a nursing home, may be eligible for NHS-funded nursing care. This means the NHS will pay a contribution towards the cost of their nursing care.
